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A Great and Well Deserved Tribute to Dave Bowen

A well-deserved recognition to Dave was made at the reunion. The following is the text of the presentation, written by Vic Gulliver.

"I'd like to take a couple of minutes to tell you about one of our members. Dave Bowen joined our Association more than two decades ago when the Association was just beginning to grow into what we see today. When Floyd Palmer was our President, Floyd talked Dave into serving on a committee that was working to create a Memorial to fallen VP crews. That committee was headed by Don Hanson, and was looking for a way to purchase a P2V aircraft as a centerpiece for the Memorial.

When the purchase and display of an aircraft proved to be problematic, the committee turned to the idea of building a Memorial with a statue and a granite wall of honor. You've all seen the magnificent Whidbey Patrol Squad-

ron Memorial. Did you know that Dave Bowen designed

that Memorial? You can go to our website and see Dave's original drawing of what the Memorial should look like. Dave was a driving force in every phase of the development of the Memorial. It was Dave who scouted out many sculptors from around the country, and led the committee to select Michael Maiden to create our airman statue. It was Dave who researched many granite companies in the area, and led the committee to selecting the beautiful granite that was used in the Memorial.

It was a nearly impossible task to identify the names of those to be honored on the Memorial. There is no central repository of VP aircrew casualty names. It took more than a year of constant research effort for Dave to come up with an accurate list of deceased Whidbey VP crewmembers. The names were to be carved in stone and had to be 100% correct.

Dave was there, shovel in hand, when the foundation for the Memorial was dug. He was there supervising the laying of bricks when the patio of the Memorial was created. He made trips to the foundry to ensure the accuracy of the design of the airman statue. He was there when the statue and the granite wall were set in place. Every year since the Memorial was dedicated, Dave has been out there polishing the statue, trimming the grass, and sprucing up the bricks on the patio.

Our Association owes a debt of gratitude to Dave Bowen for his many years of service to our organization. I'd like to have Dave come forward to receive a token of our appreciation."

Mission

The P-8A Poseidon is quickly becoming a leader in long-range anti-submarine warfare (ASW), anti -surface warfare, intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance (ISR), as the replacement aircraft for the P-3C Orion.

Description

The P-8A Poseidon, the U.S. Navy's maritime patrol aircraft, is capable of broad-area, maritime and littoral operations, and is also successful at search and rescue.

Operating with a smaller crew, yet delivering an extended global reach, greater payload capacity, higher operating altitude, open-systems architecture and significant growth potential, the P-8A provides more combat capability.

With state of the art technology, developed specifically for the Poseidon, such as synthetic aperture radar, an electro and optical infrared sensor turret, and increased acoustic capability, the aircraft conducts concurrent passive and active processing.

In addition to aircraft procurement, the program office, NAVAIR's PMA-290, is also focused on depot-level maintenance, which is currently on-going at U.S.-based airframe maintenance facilities. Additionally, training systems infrastructure improvements are ongoing, along with the continued integration and fleet delivery of preplanned incremental capability upgrades.

Equipped with state of the art radars, sensors and a new air-to-air refuel capability, the P-8A is scheduled to receive periodic future enhancements to keep pace with the ASW threat.

The P-8A Poseidon is responsive and interoperable with traditional manned forces and evolving unmanned sensors.

Chaplain's Corner by Doug Millar

Many of you who are reading this have recently returned from our latest VP-2 Reunion in San Diego. It was a great reunion and the weather could not have been more beautiful. Sadly our numbers continue to decrease due to attrition and health issues, but for the 85 of us who were there it was a refreshing and encouraging time of reuniting with great friends and reliving times spent together in the past.

Following the reunion my wife and I went to Williamsburg, Virginia, which is the area where we both were raised. We try to get there annually, particularly in the fall when the colors in the trees are at their best, to visit with friends and family. While driving through the town in our rental car, we stopped at a pedestrian crossing to let a woman cross the street and immediately were "rear ended" by a SUV that violently knocked us through the crossing and to the curbside. Thankfully we did not hit anyone in the crosswalk. Within two or three seconds of the crash, a voice suddenly came booming into the car saying, "This is OnStar. We have your location pinpointed on Richmond Road. Is anyone seriously hurt in your car? We are dispatching the police and also a 911 ambulance to your location immediately."

For a moment I wondered who and where this voice was coming from, but then I responded to the question and within two minutes the police arrived on the scene - followed almost immediately by the ambulance. We were quickly helped into the ambulance where we were examined and observed for possible injuries. Fortunately we suffered nothing more than minor abrasions and some discomfort in our necks and backs. The driver who hit us also was not injured, nor was her infant daughter who was strapped into a car seat in her vehicle. We have much for which to be thankful, and indeed we are.

It is always dangerous to try to compare any of our human inventions or actions to that of God, because these comparisons always fall ridiculously short of the greatness and ability of the Almighty. But I do see some similarities and contrasts between our OnStar experience and our relationship with our Heavenly Father. Like OnStar - God knows exactly where we are at any moment, and he is always standing beside us and willing to help us in any situation. Unlike OnStar - God understands totally our situation: our concerns: our frailties: our strengths: our needs: our wants; our eternal destiny; and he is able to supply what is needed for each. In fact, he has already provided the solution for our eternal destiny by sending his son, Jesus Christ, to live a perfect life, die, and be resurrected afterwards - which allowed Jesus to pay the penalty for each of our sins. But, unlike OnStar, God will not force himself into our situation. He waits patiently for us to call him in. He has said, "Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in to him and dine with him, and he with me." (Revelation 3:20)

Have you ever invited Christ into your life? If not, I would urge you to do so today. The Bible tells us in 2nd Corinthians 6:2, "**Behold, now is the accepted time; now is the day of salvation.**"
