<u>Object</u>: To provide opportunity for Veterans of World War 2, Korean War and Vietnam War Veterans to visit memorials dedicated to those who served in those conflicts.

I learned of this event from our daughter, Debbie, who had heard about it from a customer at her work. She obtained the name and phone # of the local coordinator of the event, Paul Loeffler. I obtained and submitted an application form and I was on the list.

Each participating Veteran was required to have a "Guardian", someone to assist them during the 3 day excursion. I was fortunate to have our Grandson, Brandon Wolfe, Debbie's son, an Air Force Veteran of the Afghanistan Conflict, who volunteered to be my Guardian.

The transportation was provided by Allegiant Airlines, was free for Veterans, paid for by Community donations. However, Guardians had to come up with \$1000. Our family took care of that!

At 5:30 am on Monday, October 24th all 67 Veterans, their Guardians and family members assembled at the Fresno-Yosemite International Airport for a final brief and farewell. We departed at about 8:30 am.

At about 5:30 pm (Eastern time), 2:30pm (Pacific time), we landed at Baltimore Washington Airport and loaded on to 3 tour buses.

About 6:30 pm we arrived at the American Legion Post 276 in Severn Maryland, where we were welcomed and treated to a delicious BBQ steak dinner! We were then bused to the Crystal City Hilton Hotel where we spent the night.

On Tuesday morning, day 2 of our trip, we had a hearty breakfast at the Hilton, boarded our buses and headed out.

Our first stop was at the World War 2 Memorial where a group photo was taken of all 67 Veterans in their red jackets and Guardians in their blue jackets, all provided by the Fresno area trip contributors.

Our particular group of Veterans was composed of 10 WW2 Vets, the rest of us were Korean War era and some Vietnam Vets. Thirty five of our Veterans were in wheel chairs so loading and unloading from 3 buses several times to visit several of the memorials required team work-and it worked well.

Three Guardians on each bus were selected as the safety team for their bus. One was positioned at the top of the steps to the bus, one at the bottom and one to get a wheelchair out of the bus baggage area for those who needed one.

Besides visiting the WW2 Memorial, we visited the Tomb of the Unknown, observed the changing of the Guard, the laying of a wreath by a little boy and girl from a local elementary or middle school and by 2 of our Honor Flight WW2 Veterans.

We visited the Smithsonian Air & Space Museum, visited the Spacecraft exhibits on the ground floor, but were advised not to try going to the 2nd floor to see the aviation exhibits – considering our age group – 85-95 years...

We got to eat lunch at the "largest McDonalds in the country", located in the A&S museum, paid for by our 4 Central California Congressmen.

We visited the Women's Museum which highlights women who have been associated with our military since the Revolutionary War, including those in the Red Cross and the USO. Next we drove past the Marine (Iwo Jima flag raising) Memorial and visited the Korean and Vietnam Memorials. We then had an excellent dinner at the Hilton.

The third day, after a hearty Hilton breakfast, we visited the Air force and Navy Memorials where we ran into a group of FFA (Future Farmers of America) from Los Banos, CA, who had attended an FFA convention in Ohio and had taken a side trip to Washington, D.C..

We had a tasty bag lunch then headed back to our Allegiant Airlines aircraft and crew at the Baltimore Washington Airport for the flight home. I guess we were an imposing looking group, about 140 Veterans and Guardians in our red and blue jackets as we strode through the terminal. A number of kids, and some adults greeted us with a friendly, "Thank you for your service, Sir!"

With that we boarded our aircraft and headed home. About an hour out of Fresno we had a "Mail Call". One of the Honor Flight staff members had a good size mail bag and called out the names of each Veteran who had mail. I think I may have had the largest bundle of mail, including a bag of cookies that disappeared before I got one.

I have to thank our daughter, Diana, who contacted friends and relatives, inviting them to write. A number of you did and I thank you all from the bottom of my heart!

Upon our arrival at Fresno and our aircraft receiving a "Welcome Home" spray by 2 fire trucks, we received an enthusiastic welcome by close to 1000 friends and family members.

It was a very interesting and educational, well organized trip coordinated by recently retired CEO of the Central Valley VA Medical Center in Fresno, Al Perry. This was his 12th and final Honor Flight – Job well done!

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Your Associations provides four scholarships each year at Hard Work U. This is an example of how College of the Ozarks is coping with the coronavirus pandemic.

As the Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic unfolds, College of the Ozarks has taken steps to slow the spread of the virus. Our efforts began with the extension of spring break from March 16-20 until the 27th. Then we started online learning on March 30th. During this interim period, our staff members stepped up to check on students personally.

After the postponement of on-campus activities, staff members contacted every student to touch base, assess needs, and relay any pertinent information. Our staff members made over 1,500 phone calls. Dr. Sue Head, vice president for cultural affairs and dean of character education, said the main reason for this effort was to show students how much they are valued and missed.

"The launch of The Bobcat Care Team was a way for us to let our students know we care about them, especially during the extended spring break COVID-19 crisis," Head said. "We love our students, and we want them to know that! The Care Team asked a variety of questions related to the students' housing, food, family. We just wanted them to know we miss them and hope to see them soon."



Reactions to these calls were positive, and many students showed concern for their peers and teachers over themselves.

At Hard Work U, every student is required to have an on-campus job, including taking care of livestock at the farms. Due to the postponement of oncampus activities, staff members have taken over essential student jobs. These necessary tasks require staff to cross-train to complete.

Bryan Cizek, dean of work education and director of patriotic activities, has worked with the College administrators to ensure that staff members cover all essential workstations, including the farms.

"The farming operations have certainly been affected," Cizek said. "Other significantly impacted workstations include switchboard, power plant, landscaping, custodial, and the dining facility. All of these workstations are critical to campus operations that rely almost solely on students. We have around 30 employees taking on additional duties. This number does not include those who have taken on custodial duties in the buildings in which they reside. "While most staff members are currently working from home, those who are working on campus are practicing social distancing while carrying out these activities. Staff who are taking on these additional responsibilities said it is a learning experience and they appreciate the students' hard work while they are on campus.

We should be proud of the students we support.
